About CPDI:

A. Background:

There is no set pattern followed in development budget allocations at federal and provincial level. CPDI, in some of the recent reports, have unearthed that big chunk of development budget is allocated to the capitals, both provincial and federal, and periphery districts remained deprived of the necessary resource allocations. This gives rise to deprivation amongst the people of these districts. The transparency and accountability demand that some sort of formula and policy should be devised for such allocations, and it should be strictly adhered to. Another problem with allocation of district budget is that it is changed mid-year and ironically there is no rule that can stop government in doing that. The constitutional articles 84/124 give cover to federal and provincial governments to abandon the approved projects, conceive new projects mid-year or increase or decrease budget allocations for development scheme without seeking approval of the legislature. The only thing required from the government is to get supplementary budget passed from the parliament at the end of the year.
